Rayner's Rundown - with Mayor Tony Rayner

It was great to host Mayors and CEOs from across the Central West in Longreach this month for the RAPAD board meeting. RAPAD is our Regional Organisation of Councils, consisting of seven councils of the Central West. The meeting received updates from Water

Queensland, Local Government Association of Queensland, the RAPAD Power Grid initiative, Western Queensland Public Health Network, Central West Hospital and Health Service, Outback Queensland Tourism Association, Tourism and Events Queensland, Department of Environment, Science and Innovation, and the Department of Resources.

The Central West Qld Pest Management Group, Outback Regional Roads and Transport Group, and RAPAD Water and Sewerage Alliance group meetings were also held in Longreach this month. We also held the inaugural CUC RAPAD Country University Centre board meeting. This will be a great initiative and I look forward to sharing more with you soon.

We travelled to Mt Isa for the annual Western Queensland Alliance of Councils (WQAC) Assembly. The gathering brings together 24 councils from across Western Qld, providing a valuable platform to engage with experts and government representatives. The focus on infrastructure readiness, connectivity, and housing underscored the need for collaborative efforts to ensure our communities are well-equipped to face the challenges ahead.

There was an emphasis on future-ready infrastructure, particularly in light of the evolving demands on our road and water networks. Additionally, there were discussions on housing and the implications of the upcoming Brisbane 2032 Olympics for our region. The insights gained from these discussions will be instrumental as we continue to advocate for our priorities in the lead up to the state election in October.

Council offered up an exciting School Holiday Program in September, packed with a variety of activities for children aged 5 to 17. Highlights included a sports extravaganza, nature play, skatepark activities, a footy fun day, woodworking, and even an online fishing competition! A big thank you to our dedicated staff and everyone in the community who supported them to deliver this program.

Council has adopted a new Economic Development Charter and will soon be launching new supports for small businesses in our region. The charter outlines our approach to economic development and seeks to balance the different roles of Council, the community, and business. Also this month, we adopted our new small business friendly grants policy, which will be launching soon. Small business is the backbone of our economy, and we want to help provide the tools and information they need to thrive.

Overgrown land

Overgrown properties and unsightly premises can be both a nuisance and a danger to your neighbours and the community. Property owners and residents need to maintain their properties to prevent reptile harbourage, protect visual amenity, and reduce fire hazard. Apart from being unsightly, overgrown areas can attract snakes and other undesirable pests that have a detrimental impact on our environment, such as feral cats.

What is overgrown land?

Council considers a property to be 'overgrown' when there is an excess of vegetation, primarily long grass, on a property which has become unsightly and detracts from the visual amenity of the community or attracts reptiles, vermin and feral species.

Ratepayers and residents must ensure that private properties are not becoming overgrown. To allow our staff and contractors to keep the nature strips and lanes mowed, please remove all items that prevent access to the area. If you believe that a yard is overgrown or contains objects or materials that may harbour reptiles or cause a visual nuisance, you may report this to Council. Our Regulatory Services Officers conduct periodic inspections and issue compliance notices for overgrown properties.

Where land is found to be overgrown, a courtesy letter is sent to the property owner requesting the problem be rectified within a suitable timeframe. Where no action is taken, a compliance notice requiring the problem to be rectified is sent. Failure to comply with the notice will result in Council issuing a works entry notice, stipulating a timeframe when Council will enter and carry out the required work, with the costs incurred being charged to the identified responsible person for the property (either the owner or occupier). Fines may also be issued for repeated or serious offences.

Saving Water Tips

Residents are being encouraged to be water wise to assist in reducing water wastage. Below are some handy hints in being water wise:

General Household Tips

- To avoid wasting drinking water from a running tap, collect it in a bottle or jug and store it in the fridge until it is cool enough to drink.
- When you clean your fish tank, use the 'old' nitrogen and phosphorous-rich water on your plants.



Dishwasher Tips

- Look for dishwashers that have a National Water Conservation or WELS Label. The best water rating achieved by dishwashers is 5 star.
- Only use the dishwasher when you have a full load.
- Use the rinse-hold setting on the dishwasher, if it has one, rather than rinsing dishes under the tap.
- Catch running water whilst waiting for it to warm up. Use it to water plants, rinse dishes or wash fruit and vegetables.
- If you have a leaking tap, replace the washer or other components as required. Dripping taps can waste 30 - 200 litres of water per day.

Bathroom Tips

- Only fill the tub with as much water as needed. Use less for kids and pets.
- Check the temperature as you fill. Adding extra water to get the correct temperature after the bath is at the right level is wasteful.
- ♦ Regularly check your plug for leaks and replace as necessary.
- Bucket used bath water onto the garden, or use it to wash your car. Check that soaps and detergents in the water won't harm garden plants.
- Use a bucket to collect water while waiting for the shower to get hot.
- Leaking toilet cisterns waste litres of water each day. Check for leaks by putting a few drops of food dye in the cistern. If you have a leak, coloured water will appear in the bowl before the toilet has been flushed.

Community Spotlight: The Hidden Risks of Cyber Attacks

Cyber-attacks are often thought to target only large organisations, but they can and do affect local businesses and individuals as well. Here's a recent example from our community that underscores the importance of staying vigilant.

A local business owner recently faced a serious cyber incident. The owner sent an invoice via their accounting software one morning for a significant amount. By the due date, the funds hadn't arrived. When the business owner followed up with the customer, the customer revealed they had paid the invoice on the day it was received. Confusion arose when the business owner discovered that the payment had been made to a bank account different from their own.

Upon investigation, it was found that the invoice's bank details had been altered before it reached the customer, who received it only in the afternoon the day it had been sent in the morning. The altered details led the customer to unknowingly transfer funds to a fraudulent account. Despite contacting the bank, the customer received little help, as the funds had been directed to what appeared to be a valid account, which was then closed.

This troubling situation illustrates the sophistication of modern cyber-attacks. While the exact method of compromise–whether a hacked email account or an intercepted communication–is unclear, the consequences are evident. The business owner and customer had to adapt their processes, including avoiding listing bank details on invoices and verifying payment details by phone.

As technology advances, so do the tactics of cyber criminals. The rise in cyber-attacks, compounded by emerging technologies like artificial intelligence, increases risks for everyone. To safeguard yourself and your business, be cautious with email links, be selective about who you allow to access your computer remotely and stay informed about evolving threats.
